

## Pupil Premium

In the **2018/19 Budget** the school received a total of £19,630 Pupil Premium Funding (to support those children entitled to Free School Meals).

This funding is being spent on staff salaries to:

- a) Employ two full-time Teaching Assistants and a part-time SEN teacher to work partly with those Pupil Premium pupils, some of whom may also have special educational needs;
- b) To employ a specialist part-time teacher in Year 6 to work partly with those free school meal pupils who are more-able, on extension English and Maths activities to help them to attain the Higher Standard at the end of Key Stage 2.
- c) To employ a part-time SEN teacher to provide a weekly one-to-one tuition session for some Pupil Premium pupils who require additional support to help them to meet the Expected Standard in English and Mathematics, at the end of Key Stage 2.
- d) To ensure that all classes with Pupil Premium pupils have a full time Teaching Assistant.

The funding is also being used to support the families of Pupil Premium pupils with the cost of uniform; and the costs in full of day / residential visits and other special activities, to include extension and enrichment activities for more-able pupils.

All club providers offer a "free" place for Pupil Premium pupils, along with those from other low income families.

The above measures aim to ensure that Pupil Premium pupils have the same curricular / extra-curricular opportunities and are fully included in the life of the school.

In the summer of 2014, one of the two Year 6 pupils, who had been entitled to Pupil Premium funding in the past, made 2 levels of progress in Key Stage 2.

In the summer of 2015, the one Year 6 pupil who had been entitled to Pupil Premium funding in the past made 2 levels of progress in Writing and Mathematics.

In the summer of 2016, the one Year 6 pupil who was entitled to Pupil Premium funding made greater than expected progress in Key Stage 2 and, along with the two pupils who had been entitled to Pupil Premium funding in the past, reached the expected standard in reading, writing and mathematics.

In the summer of 2017, the one Year 6 pupil who was entitled to Pupil Premium funding reached the expected standard in reading and made the expected progress in writing.

In the summer of 2018, there were two Year 6 pupils who were entitled to Pupil Premium funding. One reached the expected standard in Maths and had positive progress scores in Reading and Writing; the other pupil reached the expected standard in Reading and Writing

and *Greater Development in Maths*. There were two children who had been entitled to Pupil Premium funding in the past, one of whom reached the expected standard in Reading, Writing and Maths.

In 2018, there was also one pupil who received LAC (Looked After Child) funding who attained the expected standard in Reading, Writing and Maths.
